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Remembering Gateway

A few years ago the Club sponsored a mid-summer tour that created some very pleasant memories. The destination was an unfinished resort in the Uncompaghre Plateau of southwestern Colorado. Only one member had ever seen it, but he insisted that the tour would be great, and spirits were high in anticipation of seeing the personal car collection of John and Maureen Hendricks. He's the founder of the Discovery Channels. Their collection is too large for a single public presentation, so they created a Resort and car museum, at Gateway, Colorado, through which it can be rotated.

After an early departure the caravan headed northward onto the Indian lands, skirting Monument Valley and stopped in Cortez, CO, for lunch and pit stops. From there we zigzagged northward following the Colorado/Utah border, passing over Gypsum Gap at 6,100 feet, then down to the Dolores River. And, after a good night's rest we were admitted to the third surprise ... the museum.
