

Tire Tracks — Scooped by Kudos

----Most Believed It Could Never Happen

But there it was in the November 9th *Kudos*, an article on Sedona Car Club's own Les Peck. So rather than stew over it, the Editor, has on these pages, cheerfully and <u>without</u> permission, reprinted the article not quite in its entirety. Hats off (kudos) to Les & Sally Peck.

Young at Heart

Sedona's Les Peck stays active with papier-mâché sculpting

es Peck keeps active during his twilight years doing papier-mâché sculpting. Refusing to suc-

cumb to old age and its aches and pains, he creates small wall hangings of carousel horses and animals to keep his mind sharp and his artistic skills fresh.

"It's different, and I enjoy doing it," the 82-yearold Sedona resident says from his workshop. "It's a fun way to work."

Since childhood, Peck has been fascinated with carousel horses. His stepfather worked on merry-go-rounds where he let the young lad touch up the horses.

"I always wanted to buy one but they were so expensive so I decided to build one instead," Peck recalls, eyes sparkling.

He knew wood would be too expensive so he began experimenting and discovered papier-maché and Styrofoam.

"No one could tell me how to do it so I just experimented."

He made his first life-size carousel horse in 1980 and years later reluctantly sold it for \$3,500. Several of his works can be seen throughout his house including his second horse, which hangs above his bed.

"I like it and just never took it down," he explains proudly.

At his prime, Peck created three horses a year at a cost of about \$300 each. Using acrylics, Cell-U-Clay, papier-mâché and Styrofoam, he developed vibrant carousel horses that measured approximately 60 inches long, 52 inches high and 10 inches wide. Based on an original design that he hand sculptured and painted, Peck reinforced the tail and legs of each piece with wooden dowel-

ing. Each finished horse also included his trademark – a gold tooth adorned with an artificial diamond.

These full-sized, delicate creatures look sturdy enough to hold a child, but they weigh a mere 30 pounds. They seem best suited as decorative pieces that can be mounted on a stand or wall. They can survive being dropped, but weather is its worst enemy and therefore they must be kept indoors.

Based on his knowledge and experience, Peck developed detailed instructions for others on how to create papier-māché carousel horses and animals. Several interested artists from across the United States have followed these guidelines to create their own

works of art. Peck's carousel horses also have been featured in The Carousel News & Trader.

In December 2000, Peck donated one of his prized works — a carousel horse with Native American rider — to be raffled with proceeds benefiting the Humane Society of Sedona. The lucky winner was Bill Nigh of Rimrock, Although a leaky patio roof destroyed the piece. Despite several shoulder surgeries, he refuses to retreat into retirement. Since his first operation in 2001, Peck has created about a dozen small wall hangings that weigh about 10 pounds each. His doctor also encourages him to pursue this fine art on a regular basis.

In fact, art is something he shares with his wife of 42 years, Sally. A retired junior high school teacher, Sally creates beaded gourd art and jewelry. These California natives also share a passion for Corvettes; at one time they owned five, but now just one. Age hasn't stopped this couple from drag racing their hot rod every June in Sacramento.

Peck is also a member of Sedona Railroaders, Sedona Car Club and the Northern California Corvette Association. In fact, he uses his papier-mâché sculpting skills to create decorative landscaping for his model trains.

Although Peck also paints, does stained glass and photography, he prefers this medium because it's easy to use and it's an inexpensive art form, he says.

"There's no limit on what you can do with it."


